Enrollement

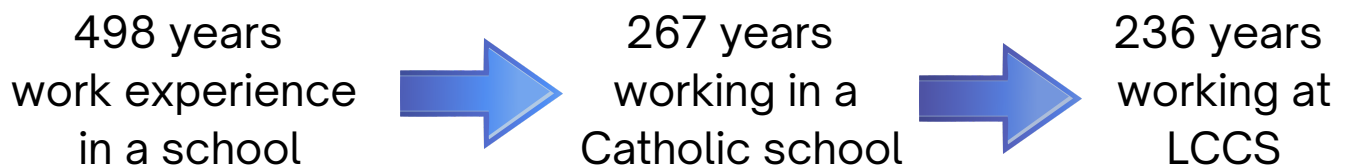
- 319 students were enrolled in PreK - 8th grade



- The average class size is 16
- 67 new students and 46 new families were welcomed into the LCCS community
- 94% of the students enrolled the year prior returned for the 25-26 school year

Curriculum Enhancements

- Adopted a new MS Spanish curriculum
- DARE offered to 5th and 8th grade students
- Provided the Hallow App to all students and families which was also used in middle school religion - 38% of our school families created an active account
- *Mystery Science* integrated into elementary school

Facility Enhancements

- Elementary restrooms were refreshed
- MPR was painted and new blinds were installed
- The middle school courtyard was leveled and re-landscaped
- PreK entry mural was created

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

REGISTRATION & TUITION

- \$200 Registration Fee per family
- \$6,400 tuition for one child, \$12,300 for 2 children, \$17,900 for 3 or more children

COST TO EDUCATE

Tuition collected is the largest source of revenue, however that does not cover the cost to educate our students. The actual cost to educate one student during the 2025-2026 school year was **\$7,675**. The difference, while sometimes short, is covered through fundraising efforts, grants, and private donations. See the following page for ideas on how to assist with this deficit. This year we were blessed with an unexpected private donation of \$314,000 which resulted in a small net profit which will be invested for future needs.

FEDERAL FUNDING

We received ~\$26,000 in Title funding which is not included in the budget below. It provided for science curriculum, STAR Testing, Accelerated Reader, technology devices, and other supplemental materials.

TUITION ASSISTANCE

Due to generous donors, we were able to award \$301,230 to 103 students.

ACCREDITATION

LCCS is accredited by the Western Catholic Educational Association (WCEA). The accreditation process includes a self study, a visiting team review, and an action plan for ongoing improvement. In the spring of 2025 LCCS was awarded a 6 year accreditation (to be renewed during the 2030-2031 school year. The action plan includes:

- Develop a system to analyze and use data to inform instruction by creating a student educational portfolios (began during the 2025-2026 school year).
- Update and provide Faculty and Staff Handbook (completed summer 2025).
- Revise Student Learning Expectations (completed spring 2025).
- Provide faith formation for the parent community.
- Provide more professional development for teachers and staff.

STUDENT LEARNING

8th GRADE PSAT

Annually, LCCS 8th grade students take the PSAT 8/9. This test is a precursor to the College Board SAT.

The 3 year total average of **ALL** testers score on this assessment is a 792, Reading and Writing a 398 and Math 393. LCCS students performed higher than the national average.

STAR ASSESSMENTS

For the first time, LCCS is sharing schoolwide STAR Assessment results with our community as one measure of student achievement and academic growth. While STAR provides valuable data on student progress in reading and math, it is only one of several tools used to assess learning. Classroom performance, teacher observations, projects, faith-based learning experiences, and other assessments play an important role in demonstrating student mastery of skills and standards. Together, these measures provide a more complete picture of our students' growth and success. STAR is a nationally normed assessment and was administered 3 times during the 25-26 school year. These scores are from the final STAR test administered in May.

Kindergarten scores are from *STAR Early Literacy* which includes early numeracy.
